

The C.G. Jung Institute of San Francisco is presenting its seventh consecutive Presidency Conference exploring the psychological dimensions of our political landscape as expressed in U.S. presidential elections. This year's conference features leading Jungians in the field of politics and psyche, providing a unique opportunity to explore the deeper meaning of the dystopian landscape we face in our political moment.

The past several election cycles have been more about cultural conflicts than policy debates. Deep polarization expresses itself in the clothing of political positions on issues such as immigration, abortion and bodily autonomy, women's and LGBTQ rights, racial, ethnic and economic divides, foreign affairs, the climate crisis, and, ultimately, the kind of leadership America wants for the future.

2024 is shaping up to literally be a Clash of the Titans with two aged white men locked in a battle that will be about far more than their individual personalities, although the contrast between their two characters will be a fundamental factor in the election. Is it an exaggeration to say that this year's presidential election may well determine the fate of democracy in the world's future? Does raising the fears of chaos, mayhem, and death pave the royal road to the White House? How can we imagine a better future when the political world is in the grips of a perpetual foul mood?

CAROLYN BATES, PhD is a Jungian analyst (I-RSJA, US) practicing in Austin, Texas. She serves as North American Editor-in-Chief for the Journal of Analytical Psychology and as President of the Texas Seminar of the I-RSJA. Over the last three decades she has offered multiple workshops and lectures on ethics, technology's influence within the collective, the phenomenon of synchronicity and collective trauma, and the reconsideration of myth through the lens of feminist politics.

She is author of publications that include Torture, Psychoanalysis & Human Rights (Routledge, 2017), Torture Survivors in Analytic Therapy: Jung, Politics, Culture (2022).
